Session 5

Regarding Sin & Forgiveness

Question 1: If all sin is the same, how are some sins considered an abomination to God? Can any of these sins keep us from getting into Heaven?

(Read: Proverbs 6:16-19) In this passage, the writer describes seven sins. Some consider them to be the "Seven Deadly Sins". This is not an exhaustive list, but it lists the sins that God <u>hates</u>. Below is the list of sins:

- 1.) "Proud or haughty eyes." This is the sin of pride.
- 2.) "Lying tongue." This is the sin of <u>deception</u>. This person distorts reality for their own personal gain.
- 3.) "Hands that shed innocent blood." This is a person that can't control their <u>anger</u>. They are full of <u>wrath</u>.
- 4.) "A heart that devises wicked plans." These people are full of greed. They tend to do things to get their own way.
- 5.) "Feet that are swift in running to evil." These people love <u>sin</u>. They find pleasure in doing evil things.
- 6.) "A false witness who speaks lies." This is a person who does not speak <u>truth</u>. They are deceitful.
- 7.) "A man who stirs up dissension among brothers." This person enjoys causing <u>trouble</u> among family and friends.

Yes, God detests these sins but these are not the only sins God does not like. God hates <u>all sin</u> because Jesus <u>died</u> for all sin. The answer to the question is this, none of the sins above can keep a person out of Heaven. <u>Salvation</u> is available to anyone who will place their faith and <u>trust</u> in Jesus as their Lord and Savior.

The evidence of this is found in (Romans 10:9, 13; I John 1:9; Rev. 3:20)

Question 2: The book of Proverbs states that a "drunkard lips cannot enter the gates of Heaven." Does this refer to a drunkard at death? One who drinks on occasion or a Christian who still is involved in this sin?

There are several verses in Proverbs that speak about the consequences of those that are drunkards. Here are a few: Proverbs 20:1; 23:20-21; and 26:9. But again, being a drunkard does not keep a person out of heaven as long as they are willing to <u>repent</u> and place their faith and trust in Jesus Christ. Even for those that drink that are Christians, like any sin, God wants us to <u>confess</u> it and <u>turn</u> from it. Forgiveness is a <u>prayer</u> away. The guide to how we should handle sin is found in James 4:17 (Read passage).

Prayer & Satan

Question 1: Can Satan hear our prayers?

The answer is <u>yes</u>. He can only hear them when they are out <u>loud</u>. He can't hear our <u>silent</u> prayers. Scripture never states that Satan can <u>read</u> our mind. Scriptures never state than an angel is <u>all knowing</u> and if a holy angel is not all knowing neither can a fallen one either. Satan is high skilled at <u>predicting</u> human behavior because of his years of practice. He can <u>anticipate</u> what you might do or how you might react in a given situation without knowing your <u>thoughts</u>. So, should we avoid praying out loud? The answer is <u>no</u>. (Read: I John 4:4) In God we have power, for He who is in you (Jesus) is greater than he (Satan) that is in the world.

Question 2: Can Satan block or intercept our prayer?

The answer is <u>no</u>. Our prayers can only be <u>hindered</u> by our self-defeating <u>doubt</u> and <u>sinful</u> lifestyles. James 1:5-8 talks about faithless prayers that are <u>powerless</u> and ineffective. Basically, Satan cannot <u>hurt</u> anyone without God's <u>permission</u>. (Read: Job 1:6-12) In this passage, God allowed Satan to attack Job. When Christians enter into <u>sin</u>, they open themselves up to Satan's attack.

Question 3: Can Satan answer our misdirected prayers and give us what is not actually good for us?

The answer is <u>yes</u> and <u>no</u>. He can do it, but not without God's <u>permission</u>. The Bible asserts that God can give people over to <u>deception</u> when they refuse to believe the <u>truth</u>. (Read: II Thessalonians 2:9-12)

Conclusion: Satan will answer misdirected prayers, give signs and do anything to move us away from God. Therefore, be alert and <u>listen</u> to God's Holy Word. In humility, desire Christ more than your own ways. (I Peter 5:8)
